NBA Finals: It ain't over till it's over

After Game 1 of the NBA Finals, the series somehow already felt like it was over. The Miami Heat got out to an early 23-10 lead in the first quarter, but were quickly overthrown by the more star-studded Lakers team, eventually losing 116-98. Heading into the weekend without Bam Adebayo and Goran Dragic, who both got hurt in the opening game, no one expected much from this Heat team, but here we are three days later with a 2-1 series that might just go the distance.

The Lakers picked up right where they left off in Game 2, with LeBron, Anthony Davis and even playoff Rajon Rondo coming up big in a 124-114 victory. Adebayo's absence was felt from the start — particularly on the defensive end — as his backups Kelly Olynyk and Meyers Leonard are much better known for their offensive game. With the big man out, the Lakers had their way in the paint, outscoring the Heat 56-46 inside and racking up 16 offensive rebounds. LeBron and AD once again showed why they are considered the best duo in the NBA, combining for 65 points, with AD adding 14 rebounds and LeBron flirting with another triple double.

The Heat put together a solid game, hitting the 50-40-90 mark as a team and moving the ball effectively through Jimmy Butler. Without two of his biggest weapons and ball handlers, Butler played a relatively passive role, scoring 25 points on just 7-17 shooting, but piling on

a playoff-best 13 assists. Other contributors on the offensive end were Olynyk and Tyler Herro, who chipped in 24 and 17 points respectively.

In the end it was clear the Lakers were simply the better team, as they led by more than 10 more often than not throughout this game. And when the announcement came out that Dragic and Adebayo would miss Game 3 as well, the outlook was bleak for Miami and their fans.

Enter Jimmy Butler, who after taking on a less aggressive role in Game 2 completely took over in the most important game of his career to date.

Much like in Game 1, the Heat got off to an early 13-point lead. Also similarly to Game 1, the

Lakers had it down to three by the end of the first. The second and third quarters were as close as the two teams have played and heading into the fourth Miami held just a five-point lead.

The Heat got off to a quick start in the fourth, opening up a double digit lead, but LeBron and AD wouldn't give up getting the game within two or three points on multiple occasions. What kept them from getting over the hump and taking the lead? Butler. Jimmy Buckets had one of the best games of his career, finishing with 40 points, 11 rebounds and 13 assists, just the fourth 40-point triple double in NBA Finals history.

Butler willed his team to vic-

tory in this one on the offensive end, but it was also the complete defensive effort that earned them the win. By game's end, the Lakers had committed 19 turnovers (including 10 in the first quarter) and could not for the life of them figure out Miami's zone defense. Davis finished with just 15 points, and only three other players got in double figures for the Lakers.

Bam and Dragic could potentially return for Game 4, making the series that everyone thought was lost much more interesting as we gear up for Tuesday's matchup. If there is one thing we can take away from this weekend of games, it's that you can never count out Jimmy Butler and the Miami Heat.

LEAGUE OF LEGENDS: THE EAST'S SUCCESS

As fans around the world watched the 2020 Play-Ins Stage of the World Championship for League of Legends, it seemed like the COVID-19 pandemic might've legitimately had an impact on the teams and players. The teams from smaller regions like Russia, Brazil and Turkey put on exceptional performances, surpassing the historical expectations set for play-ins teams. The Turkish lineup, Papara SuperMassive, eliminated the fourth seed out of Europe, MAD Lions. LGD Gaming from China made it but barely; they were one game away from being the first team eliminated from Worlds.

But once the Group Stage started on Saturday, it was clear the magic hadn't necessarily carried over. The event opened with a dominating win by TOP Esports over FlyQuest. The dominating wins continued as the Unicorns of Love were demolished by DRX, Rogue claimed a win for Europe of PSG Talon, who have their full roster again and DAMWON Gaming of Korea beat JD Gaming, a Chinese roster.

The close game on day one came when LGD Gaming, who had struggled in the play-ins, came up against Gen.G. At 45 minutes long, it was the longest game by 11 minutes, and ended up as a close game. While Gen.G seemed to have the edge, LGD was not as far out as most people would've predicted after their abysmal start to Worlds, and it took the full 45 minutes for Gen.G to claim a very shaky victory.

North America's woes continued; they would not claim a win until Day Three, when FlyQuest managed a victory over the Unicorns. As of Monday, North America has a pitiful one win and five losses. PSG Talon and the Unicorns, two of the four play-ins teams, have yet to win a game and sit at 0-5 combined.

In Group A, Machi Esports from the PCS has managed a better than expected 1-1 record, beating Team Liquid but losing to G2. G2 seemingly shook off their troubles from summer; while they were the first seed from Europe, they had inconsistency issues and a lot of problems during the Summer Split. But in the first few days, dominant wins over Machi and Suning made it clear that G2 had come to claim the trophy that they'd been so close to in 2019.

It's clear the Eastern teams are going to be the favorites to win this championship. The Chinese teams have combined for a 6-3 record, while the Koreans are boasting a 6-1, with DRX having the only loss, coming from a close game against Top Esports. Group D has been perhaps the closest group thus far; FlyQuest barely beat the Unicorns today, too, and DRX looked more than capable of taking Top down had they not suffered a series of mistakes.

WNBA: Seattle take the finals by storm

Breanna Stewart is the name ringing through the WNBA finals. After the Seattle Storm lost to the Las Vegas Aces both times the teams faced off during the regular season, Stewart has played a major role in the victories that the Storm were able to achieve thus far in the finals.

The Storm are currently 2-0 in this best-of-five finals series.

Stewart finished Game 1 of

the finals with 37 points, 15 rebounds and 4 blocks as the Storm secured a 93-80 victory.

"I'm excited for the big moment and the big stage. I expect to be here," Stewart told Associated Press. "... This is why I play basketball. This is why I play, to have big games to help my team in big moments."

Stewart nearly broke Angel McCoughtry's WNBA finals record in scoring, but was shy of it by one point. Sue Bird on the other hand, who is also a key contributor to the Storm, broke two WNBA playoff-records by ending Game 1 with 16 assists and having 10 assists in the first half.

As the Storm are on the verge of a second championship within three years, Stewart went on to lead the Storm in Game 2 as well, ending with 22 points. The Storm, as a whole, set a WNBA championship round record of 33 assists, led by Sue Bird with 10 assists, as they defeated Las Vegas 104-91.

WNBA MVP A'ja Wilson led the Aces in Game 2 with 20 points.

Game 2 for the Aces consisted of five free-throw attempts to the Storm's 15 attempts, alongside 15 turnovers. This Aces team is used to averaging

over 23 attempts at the line, yet only managed to get five attempts, which did not sit well with coach Bill Laimbeer.

"We shoot five free throws, we shoot more than anyone in the history of league," Laimbeer explained in an interview with Associated Press. "That was the determining factor in this ballgame. They got fouled and got calls."

The Storm will either end the Finals series with Game 3 on Tuesday, or the Aces will push for there to be a Game 4. With either team, anything is possible.

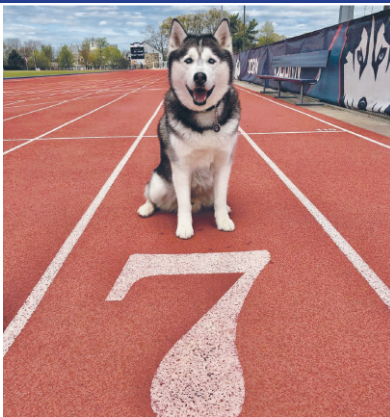

DB's Weekly Take: The NFL's top 10 quarterbacks right now

By the time you're reading this, the 2020 NFL season will be essentially a quarter of the way over, with every team except the Tennessee Titans and Pittsburgh Steelers having played four games. So I thought I'd do a quarterback ranking based on my observations from the first four weeks of the season. Some of the guys on this list are very predictable, since they were expected to hold their place among the league's best. But others have overachieved this season and made their way into the top 10 discussion. Feel free to disagree with me, as this is just my personal list. Here we go.

10. Tom Brady, Tampa Bay Buccaneers

If I was writing this at half-time of Sunday's game, Brady wouldn't even have been in the running for a spot on this list. He looked pretty bad. But his incredible second-half comeback against the L.A. Chargers led by rookie Justin Herbert — a guy who could definitely be on this list before season's end — allows him to sneak on at No. 10. He threw for 369 yards and five touchdowns to mount a 17-point comeback against the same defense that gave Patrick Mahomes fits a couple of weeks ago. (Spoiler: Mahomes is on this list somewhere.)

After a below-average first two weeks, Brady has played like himself again in the last two, throwing eight touchdowns to just one interception

during that time. His most recent performance against the Chargers was one of his best since his 2017 MVP season. The 43 year-old quietly is sixth in the league in passing yards with 1,122 and third in the league in touchdown passes with 11 at the time of writing.

He has thrown four interceptions this season, including two really ugly pick-sixes, but the good has definitely outweighed the bad so far, and the Buccaneers are 3-1 as a result. If Brady continues to get comfortable in his new environment, the "Brady is washed" crowd may have to postpone their party for another season. Because it looks like the six-time Super Bowl champion still has more in the tank.

9. Kyler Murray, Arizona Cardinals

Murray being on here is a classic example of passing the eye test. His stats aren't particularly impressive this year passing the ball, but if you made a high-light reel of the 10 best plays in the NFL this season, Murray could easily have three on there. He's up there with Lamar Jackson for the most electric running quarterback in the game.

In fact, he's ahead of Jackson — he's got 1,000 rushing yards (265) and rushing touchdowns (four, tied with Cam Newton) for a quarterback this season. And while he's struggled a little bit passing — he's third in the league with five interceptions — Murray has also thrown for seven touchdowns and is developing a great connection with DeAndre Hopkins, who leads the league with

39 receptions.

Murray had his best game passing in the Cardinals' most recent game, a 31-21 loss to the Carolina Panthers. He threw three touchdowns and zero picks. If he can have more days like that moving forward, he'll find himself in the top five not before long.

8. Derek Carr, Las Vegas Raiders

Carr is definitely one of the surprises on this list. Once considered one of the brightest young players in the league, he kind of fell by the wayside the last couple of years. But he is back in a big way this season looking to lead the Raiders to the playoffs for just the second time in his seven-year tenure.

Carr has completed over 73% of his passes this season for 1,095 yards, eight touchdowns and zero interceptions through the first four games. His 113.6 passer rating is good for fifth in the league at the time of writing. He's been extremely efficient so far and exactly what the Raiders need to balance their impressive rushing attack headlined by Josh Jacobs.

If Carr can keep this up, the Raiders could be a surprise playoff team in this year's expanded postseason. He's been nothing short of terrific.

7. Deshaun Watson, Houston Texans

The one thing they got right was drafting a franchise quarterback in Watson, but they've been so inept at putting him in a position to succeed. Round six of the Ligue 1 season served as a reality check for all teams looking to take away the league title from Paris-Saint Germain. Despite the slow start, the Parisians demonstrated that it is going to take an extraordinary feat to dethrone them as champions of France's premier footballing division.

The richest club in France hosted Angers SCO at the Parc Des Princes on Friday, Oct. 2, absolutely decimating them 6-1 in a game which saw new signing Alessandro Florenzi score his first goal for the club, an extraordinary volley from just inside the right side of Angers box.

Attacking midfielder Neymar Jr. then scored his first two goals of the season, with forward Kylian Mbappé and right back Alessandro Florenzi able to square it back to him at the top of the box, slotting it into the back of the net. Midfielders Julian Draxler and Idrissa Gana Gueye, along with Mbappé, scored the last three goals of the match to make it 6-1 for Paris.

Despite the great result, the headlines were stolen by a continued feud between PSG manager Thomas Tuchel and sporting director Leonardo Nascimento de Araujo. Tuchel expressed his discontent about the club's lack of activity in the transfer market after the match. "If we stay like this, with this reduced squad, we cannot expect to have the same objectives, even though we could still reach them. In general, we lose too many players for nothing..." he said. Leonardo was questioned about the comments made by the German coach after the match. "We did not like these statements. The club did not like them, neither did I personally like them ... If he decides to stay, he needs to respect the board's strategy, the internal rules and the moment that the club is going through, which is delicate."

This comes after reports from British media outlet The Daily Mail, which claimed PSG players were "losing faith in boss Thomas Tuchel." Although this article was published after back-to-back losses to RC Lens and Olympique de Marseille — with form improving since then — players inside the dressing room are still very critical of the German, stating his only tactic is to "give the ball to Neymar." Furthermore, relationships between key players have deteriorated, with Tuchel's relationship with main striker Mauro Icardi said to be "cold."

If Tuchel is able to get results, all will be forgotten. However, any slip-up will be used to get rid of him, with former manager Borussia Dortmund beginning his third season at the French capitol.

Olympique de Marseille and Olympique Lyonnais met Sunday, Oct. 4 in what can only be de-

scribed as anticlimactic. The "Choc Des Olympiques" may not be the biggest rivalry in French football, but it's definitely an unique battle between two historic sides.

Undoubtedly, these two teams have the best squads they have had in quite some time. Lyon were able to keep the likes of midfielder Houssem Aouar and forward Memphis Depay, which only bolster an already solid team with players such as center midfielder Maxence Caqueret, right midfielder Karl Toko Ekambi, left midfielder Maxwell Cornet and striker Moussa Dembélé.

The opposing side has veteran fullbacks Hiroki Sakai and Jordan Amavi, who consistently go up and down the pitch, maintaining their tactical discipline in defense while serving in balls into the box in attack, attempting to find the head of strikers Dario Beneditto and Nemanja Radonic, respectively. Moreover, right winger Florian Thauvin is a veteran member of the squad who has appeared more than 150 times for "Les Phocéens."

Transitioning to what occurred in the match, the beginning stages showed Marseille coming out very sluggishly, something that does not come as a surprise to anyone who has watched them play in the past three weeks. Despite Lyon putting Marseille goalkeeper Steve Mandanda under pressure, Thauvin took advantage of a Lyon loss of possession, finding attacking midfielder Dimitri Payet, who was able to slide it into the back of the net.

Payet's solid performance would be cut short, however, as he was shown red for a reckless tackle on Lyon right back Léo Dubois, stepping on his ankle with the studs of his cleat. Although originally shown a yellow card, a VAR review would see

the yellow card exchanged for a straight red. Like the beginning of the match, Lyon once again took control, with quick play around Marseille's box leading to a penalty for "Les Gones," after center back Álvaro Gonzalez stomped on left back Melvin Bard's right foot.

Lyon continued dominating the match, testing Mandanda, who came up big for Marseille and arguably kept them in the game. However, it was Lyon that ultimately proved to be their own worst enemy, not taking advantage of the multiple chances they created, particularly a Memphis Depay cross that rolled across the six yard box and somehow was not put into an empty net by Thiago Mendes, who hit the post.

Marseille should definitely feel lucky to have left the Groupama Stadium with a single point, as the wasted opportunities by Lyon prevented this game from being a four or five goal defeat.

Manager Rudi Garcia and his Lyon squad will leave disappointed that they were unable to claim the three points, but content with the fact they finally seem to have found a style of play, revolving around possession and quick build-up play in the opposition's half.

The pressure on manager André Villas-Boas will only continue to mount. His team has been performing dreadfully as of late, not winning their last four matches and looking very lost on the pitch. They should be eager to

change things before the Champions League group stage, unless they wish to be embarrassed by Europe's elite.

Marseille now stand 10th in the table with nine points, while Lyon stand 14th with seven points. The draw ultimately did not benefit either team, with both falling in the table as a result.

Niko Kovac's men encountered a hurdle they were not able to overcome, and that would be Olivier Dall'Oglio and his Stade Brestois 29 squad when they traveled to the Stade Francis Le Ble on Sunday, Oct. 4.

Monaco continue working with a relatively young team that is still maturing before our very eyes, with center backs Benoît Badier and Chrislain Mastima, right back Giulian Biancone and defensive midfielder Aurélien Tchouaméni all below the age of 20.

This inexperience ultimately led them to concede their first goal early in the match after not being able to handle an intense press from Brestois, losing the ball in their half and conceding off a cross put into the net at the far post by right midfielder Romain Faivre.

They committed this same sacrilegious error less than 10 minutes after the first, with veteran midfielder Cesc Fàbregas uncharacteristically losing the ball in his own half. Brestois striker Steve Mouinie then took a shot on goal, just barely being cleared off the line by Monaco center back Chrislain Matsima.

Midfielder Sofian Diop and left winger Gelson Martins were two of the most creative players in this squad, moving the ball from side to side in the second half and finding fullbacks Giulian Biancone and Ruben Aguilar, putting crosses into the box that Stevan Jovetic — who came in for the sub-par Wissam Ben Yedder — was not able to connect

not winning their last four matches and looking very lost on the pitch. They should be eager to

Aguilar continued to be the

outlet for Monaco throughout the second half, but he could not put effective balls into the box, consistently missing the target or sending it out for a goal kick.

The best opportunity of the day came from center back Benoît Badier, who was one-on-one with the goalkeeper from less than a yard out, with his shot sailing into the stands. Despite putting Brestois under pressure for the majority of the second half, Brestois would hold on to the victory, taking all three points.

This result moved Brestois up to 11th in the table with nine points, while Monaco fell to sixth with 10 points.

Veteran players Fabregas, Ben Yedder and Jovetic have not been able to make their presence felt in a very average squad. It's as if the inexperience and schoolboy errors made by these young players are toxic, with Ben Yedder playing below his usual standard, and Fabregas making uncharacteristic errors. Jovetic simply has not been able to find a rhythm with this young squad, once again demonstrating how difficult it will be to make an impact on this team.

Monaco's faith will continue to trust in the former Croatian International, as they understand this rebuild will be a very grueling process. They've gone through three managers in the span of two years and understand that a job like the one Kovac did at Eintracht Frankfurt in Germany — revitalizing them and making it one of the Bundesliga's best clubs — will not happen overnight.

Despite this, football fans are impatient. If Kova does not show some sort of improvement in the squad by the end of the season, his stint at the club may well be over by next summer.

Sergio Garcia captured his first win on the PGA Tour in over three years this past weekend at the Sanderson Farms Championship in Jackson, Mississippi. He was able to break out of a slump that left him out of the world top 50 for the first time since 2011 and cut from three of his last four events, shooting a solid 5-under final round to rally for the victory.

Garcia struggled on the front nine, recording two bogeys but still shooting a 2-under 34. This left him two strokes off the lead heading into the final nine holes. On the back nine, he was able to find his stride, eagling the par-5 14th hole to regain a tie for the lead and then capping it off with a stellar approach shot on the 18th hole that left him a three-foot putt for birdie and the win. He then

sunk the final putt with his eyes closed — a strategy that he has been implementing on and off recently — to win.

Peter Malnati, who has been in a slump of his own recently, shot a strong 9-under final round to make a late push and headed into the clubhouse tied for the lead. He was looking for his first Tour victory in five years, but his career-best 63 wasn't enough, as Garcia was able to make a final birdie on the 18th hole for the victory. J.T. Posten finished third after starting off the final round tied for the lead.

The Tour now turns to the Shriners Hospital for Children Open, a favorite for many golfers because of the charity events that come along with it, as the weekend looks to bring money in to raise awareness for childhood cancer. Kevin Na is looking to defend his title from the past year at TPC Summerlin in Las Vegas.

From the Capitol: Hartford finish season at the top of Group F

Hartford Athletic traveled to MSU Soccer Park on Sunday for its final game of the regular season against the New York Red Bulls II. Everything was on the line for the visitors, as a win meant a guaranteed home playoff game in the postseason; and Hartford pulled it off with two goals late in the match.

Red Bulls II took its first shot of the match in the 8th minute from a throw-in. John Tolkin threw the ball back into play toward Sebastian Elney who dribbled the ball into Hartford's final third of the pitch. Ripping a shot just outside the penalty box, the ball was blocked by Parfait Mandanda. Hartford's Alex Dixon and Éver Guzmán tried to go on the counterattack shortly after, but Joseph Fala managed to put himself ahead of Guzmán. The Baby Bulls had another great shot in the 15th minute from Elney again.

With three Hartford players marking him, he made a last-second cut to his left and went for the ground shot. Close, but the ball strolled just wide of the net.

Five minutes later, Hartford could've had, in my opinion, a penalty called for them but the referees said otherwise. Hartford went on the attack right after a throw-in where Aiden Mesias lobbed the ball up the field to Dixon. Dixon went on the run from the right side and cut inward to the penalty box where he was met by Red Bulls defenders Joseph Zalinsky and Joseph Fala, who sandwiched the forward. No call was given, and the Baby Bulls gradually went on the counterattack just minutes after. Elney ran straight from the middle to the right side of the penalty box where he crossed to Jake LaCava. Taking a shot off a volley, it wasn't accurate enough and the ball went just wide again.

The remainder of the first half was mainly dominated

by Red Bulls II. Hartford didn't have its fair share of chances until the 47th minute. Dixon went on the attack with the options of Guzmán to his left or Danny Barrera to his right, and he ultimately went with Barrera. Nearly saved by Omar Sowe from a sliding tackle, Barrera tried to cross the ball in but was intercepted by the Red Bulls II keeper.

New York's momentum didn't leave the pitch, as in the opening minutes of the second half, there was another great chance to score.

Omar Sowe went on to run and passed to Sebastian Elney after the Hartford defense was caught off-guard. Elney took a powerful shot by the near post, but Mandanda blocked it out for a corner kick.

A couple minutes later, Hartford would respond with a chance from Barrera. Receiving the ball from Justin Haak, Barrera made a quick turnaround and took a shot from the right side of the penalty area to the far post. A great chance from the visitors, but it was saved at the last second by the Red Bulls II keeper. Tyreke Johnson tried to keep the ball in play but knocked it over the end line. Guzmán had another opportunity to score for Hartford as the Red Bulls II keeper went well off his line shortly after, but he couldn't get a strong enough kick to score. Dixon took his chance in the 52nd minute, but the keeper was quick to react.

In the 65th minute, Hartford would finally get its long-

awaited lead in the match. Dixon made his way to New York's final third where he passed to Guzmán. Guzmán went for the shot but had a weak touch for it to be on target. That was no problem, as Johnson waited by the far post to get the ball and score.

Ten minutes later, Hartford would score again, securing the three points they needed. Just a couple minutes earlier, in the 73rd minute, Conor McGlynn came on as a substitute for Aiden Mesias and almost instantly made an impact on the field. Johnson passed to McGlynn, who was quick to take a chance on goal. He took a powerful shot from distance and put the ball right in the back of the net. The Red Bulls II tried to get some shots in the back of Hartford's net at the death but to no avail, and Hartford would finish the regular season on a high note.

Hartford's next match will be on Saturday against Saint Louis FC in the quarterfinals of the USL Championship playoffs.

The Cowboys defense has been atrocious this season, allowing 38 points or more each of the last three weeks. The only win Dallas has is the result of Prescott taking advantage of a Falcons collapse and throwing for 450 yards. Like Watson, Prescott is not the reason for the Cowboys' struggles. The defense has put him in bad positions in almost every game, and he's had to work his hardest to overcome that.

It's sad to think about, but there's a real possibility that Prescott has the best passing season in NFL history and still goes 5-11 and misses the playoffs. How 'bout them Cowboys?

5. Josh Allen, Buffalo Bills

Allen has been the biggest quarterback surprise by far this season. He wasn't bad last year, but he wasn't anything special. This year, he's special. He's thrown for 1,326 yards and 12 touchdowns, both of which are second in the league at the time of writing. He also has the second best passer rating at 122.7. He's only thrown one interception and has added three rushing touchdowns as well.

The Bills are 4-0 right now and look like legitimate Super Bowl contenders because of Allen. His improvement in accuracy has been a big reason for his success. Allen, who completed under 59% of his throws last year, is completing almost 71% of his passes. That's a big one-year leap.

He's the definition of a dual-threat quarterback with the way

he's playing right now. He even discovered his clutch gene in Week 3 against the Rams, when his game-winning drive spared the Bills the embarrassment of blowing a 28-3 lead. The toughest part of the Bills schedule is ahead, but Allen has earned a top-five spot on this list with his brilliance so far.

4. Aaron Rodgers, Green Bay Packers

Rodgers may prove this ranking is too low with an amazing performance on Monday night, but for right now, he's fourth. He's played at an MVP level so far with almost 900 passing yards in three games and nine touchdowns compared to zero interceptions. He looks like peak Rodgers right now, and that should be scary for the rest of the league.

Rodgers is one of the best quarterbacks of this generation, so it shouldn't be a big surprise to see him playing so well. But he looks especially good to start this season, playing at a level comparable to his amazing 2016 season. The craziest part is that he only has one great receiver, Davante Adams, and he hasn't even played every game this season. Any time Rodgers is playing at his best, the Packers are Super Bowl contenders, and that certainly seems like the case this year.

3. Lamar Jackson, Baltimore Ravens

The reigning MVP comes in at No. 3 after a very good start to his season. While he doesn't have the yardage totals that other guys have on this list, Jackson

shouldn't be punished for that. The Ravens have a very run-heavy offense, but when he does get a chance to sling the ball, he makes the most of it.

Jackson is completing an even higher percentage of his passes than last season (68.4%). He's thrown seven touchdowns to just one interception, and he's still making great plays with his legs, rushing for 235 yards and a touchdown. Jackson is exactly who the Ravens need him to be to win, and as long as he stays healthy, he's going to be a top-three quarterback in this league.

2. Russell Wilson, Seattle Seahawks

Wilson is probably the league MVP at this moment. He's been unbelievable this season even

by his high standards. He leads the league with 16 touchdown passes, which puts him on pace to beat the single-season NFL record of 55. He's only thrown two interceptions, so he's taking care of the football.

Wilson is completing an astounding 75.2% of his passes to lead the league, and he is also the league leader in passer rating with 136.7. Because of how great Wilson has been, the Seahawks are probably the favorite to reach the Super Bowl from the NFC with their 4-0 record. If Wilson keeps playing at this level, there's no reason he can't bring home his first MVP award this season.

1. Patrick Mahomes, Kansas City Chiefs

Wilson may have the edge over Mahomes for the MVP right now, but Mahomes is still the best quarterback in the game. He was clearly the best coming into the season, and he's done nothing to lose that title.

In three games at the time of writing, Mahomes has thrown for 898 yards, nine touchdowns and zero picks while leading the Chiefs to a 3-0 start. You can't ask for much more than that. He tore up an elite Baltimore defense a week ago in one of the most impressive performances by any quarterback this year.

I'm going to go out on a limb and say that he's going to add to his case tonight with another great game against the New England Patriots. Simply put, Mahomes is the best in the league until someone proves differently, and I don't see that happening any time soon.
